In honor of Indigenous People's Day, the Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation will be hosting a meat distribution for tribal citizens. The goal is to increase tribal citizens' access to traditional and healthy foods. Bags will include a variety of chis-chu svn' (elk meat), in addition to chis-chu, elders will receive locally raised hay-k'vs svn' (pork meat). All tribal households are eligible to receive a bag (a household is defined as a registered tribal address – no exceptions).

Bags will be available for pickup on Monday, October11th, from 11:00 am-3:00pm at Sri'-srwvlh (Public Works and Maintenance Facilities). If you are an interested tribal household, your bag must be picked up at the designated time and place, please have your Tribal ID with you.



> Returned to her Creator September 4, 2021 Brookings, Oregon

Theresa Buckskin, (68) who will always and forever be in our thoughts and hearts, went to be with her creator on September 4, 2021 in her home in Brookings, Oregon

She was born August 12, 1953, to Emil and Evelyn Buckskin in Tollhouse, California. She was later adopted by the Kibby family of Smith River, California, in 1957.

One of her most cherished experiences in life was learning to box. She had started boxing at the age of 10 (with her older brothers and sisters) and continued on throughout her early adult life. Theresa had the honor of receiving the name "Princess Red Star" by Sioux Chief White Buffalo Man. She was known as a "true pioneer to getting the sport off the ground" and she was also ranked #2 World Welterweight with the Women's Boxing Federation in 1977. One of her matches was recorded as the first nationally televised boxing match between women. Along with the sport of boxing, she also enjoyed playing basketball, softball and volleyball.

Later in life, she made a career working with the Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation. Being employed by the Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation for 20+ years was a start to new friendships within the office and the Tolowa community. She had started out as a receptionist and was promoted to being the Enrollment Specialist up until her passing. What she loved most about her job was the interaction she had with the members; she enjoyed talking to the elders and reminiscing about the good old days.

Over the years Theresa looked forward to family gatherings, whether it be weekend barbecues, birthdays, small road trips, and especially the holidays. Her eyes lit up when she would go out and support her Grandkids during their games of soccer, basketball and track. She was the loudest one cheering them on. They were the highlight of her life because she was their number one cheerleader.

She was known as being a warm, strong-hearted, generous, friendly, easy to talk to, stubborn, feisty, diehard loving Mother/Grandmother with a distinguished sense of humor and laugh that will live on in our memories. Her love has shaped us in lasting ways and she will be forever missed as she goes on her journey.

Theresa is survived by her three children: John Kibby, Lawanda Kibby-Haro (Daniel Haro) and Kyle Kibby of Brookings, Oregon. She was exhilarated and honored to become a Grandmother "Grammy" to Sonia Haro-Hernandez (Jose Hernandez), Rosa Haro (Tony Pacheco), Leonel Haro, Elias Haro, Danika Scott, Isabella Buckskin and Dekota Buckskin; Great Grandmother to Thiago and Enzo Hernandez-Haro.

She is also survived by sisters and a brother: Darlene Buckskin, Arlene Bunton and Ross Bunton and several nieces and nephews who knew her as "Aunt Wheezy". She was proceeded in death by her parents, brothers Mike Perez and Roger Buckskin and sister Emily Buckskin-Leach.

A celebration of life was held from 2 to 6 pm on Saturday, September 18th at Lucky 7 Casino in Smith River, California.

What are El Niño and La Niña?

El Niño and La Niña are climate patterns in the Pacific Ocean that can affect weather worldwide.

Warmer or colder than average ocean temperatures in one part of the world can influence weather around the globe.

During normal conditions in the Pacific ocean, <u>trade winds</u> blow west along the equator, taking warm water from South America towards Asia. To replace that warm water, cold water rises from the depths — a process called <u>upwelling</u>. El Niño and La Niña are two opposing climate patterns that break these normal conditions. Scientists call these phenomena the El Niño-Southern Oscillation (ENSO) cycle. El Niño and La Niña can both have <u>global impacts</u> on weather, <u>wildfires</u>, <u>ecosystems</u>, and economies.


Episodes of El Niño and La Niña typically last nine to 12 months, but can sometimes last for years. El Niño and La Niña events occur every two to seven years, on average, but they don't occur on a regular schedule. Generally, El Niño occurs more frequently than La Niña.

El Niño

During El Niño, trade winds weaken. Warm water is pushed back east, toward the west coast of the Americas.

El Niño means Little Boy, or Christ Child in Spanish. South American fishermen first noticed periods of unusually warm water in the Pacific Ocean in the 1600s. The full name they used was El Niño de Navidad, because El Niño typically peaks around December.

El Niño can <u>affect our weather significantly</u>. The warmer waters cause the Pacific jet stream to move south of its neutral position. With this shift, areas in the northern U.S. and Canada are dryer and warmer than usual. But in the U.S. Gulf Coast and Southeast, these periods are wetter than usual and have increased flooding.



El Niño causes the Pacific jet stream to move south and spread further east. During winter, this leads to wetter conditions than usual in the Southern U.S. and warmer and drier conditions in the North.

El Niño also has a strong effect on marine life off the Pacific coast. During normal conditions, upwelling brings water from the depths to the surface; this water is cold and nutrient rich. During El Niño, upwelling

weakens or stops altogether. Without the nutrients from the deep, there are <u>fewer phytoplankton off the</u> <u>coast</u>. This affects fish that eat phytoplankton and, in turn, affects everything that eats fish. The warmer waters can also bring tropical species, like yellowtail and albacore tuna, into areas that are normally too cold.



La Niña

La Niña means Little Girl in Spanish. La Niña is also sometimes called El Viejo, anti-El Niño, or simply "a cold event." La Niña has the opposite effect of El Niño. During La Niña events, trade winds are even stronger than usual, pushing more warm water toward Asia. Off the west coast of the Americas, upwelling increases, bringing cold, nutrient-rich water to the surface.

These cold waters in the Pacific push the jet stream northward. This tends to lead to drought in the southern U.S. and heavy rains and flooding in the Pacific Northwest and Canada. During a La Niña year, winter temperatures are warmer than normal in the South and cooler than normal in the North. La Niña can also lead to a more severe hurricane season.



La Niña causes the jet stream to move northward and to weaken over the eastern Pacific. During La Niña winters, the South sees warmer and drier conditions than usual. The North and Canada tend to be wetter and colder.

During La Niña, waters off the Pacific coast are colder and contain more nutrients than usual. This environment supports more marine life and attracts more cold-water species, like squid and salmon, to places like the California coast.

If you are a well owner in the Smith River Plain (Either on the North or South side of the Smith River located in an agricultural area) and would like your well water tested by the California Department of Pesticide Regulation. Please send your contact information (Name, Telephone number, Email Address) to Jennifer Jacobs in the Natural Resources Department (Jennifer.jacobs@tolowa.com).

The North Coast Regional Water Quality Control Board is coordinating with the California Department of Pesticide Regulation (CDPR) to sample wells in the Smith River Plain sometime between October and December of this year. They are putting together a list of potential well owners who would like to participate and have their well sampled. The list of analytes includes current and past use pesticides among others.

Da-laa-ha~. My name is Sheryl Suu-daa-chu Steinruck. I am from the villages of Nii~-lii~-chvn-dvn and T'uu-yaa~-sdvm-dvn, suburbs of Yaa~-taa-k'vt. I have lived at 'E'rs-k'aa-ni (*Prayer Rock*) also known as the See-waa-dvn Apartments for nearly nine years.

On September 13, 2021, I joined Ch'vski Jones-Scott as a Language Specialist I in the Education Department's Nuu-wee-ya' Xwii-t'ii-dvn hat Slhtii / Connecting the Language to Our Community Project, "Our Language" grant funded by the Bureau of Indian Affairs expected to receive a No Cost 12-month extension to November 2022.

Currently, we are in the initial planning phase to develop and implement the major project outcome to produce a comprehensive on-line Dee-ni' Wee-ya' (Tolowa Language) learning program with speaking, writing and listening lessons scaffolding the existing preschool and summer camp curricula and high school courses which, was the end-product of previous language grants including our precious archival recording collections. These is a very ambitious endeavor well worth the time, energy and resources that will be expended to insure this project's success: To preserve, perpetuate and maintain our Dee-ni' Wee-ya'.

Higher Education Program (HEP):

So far, for the fall term there is a total of 68 students using Higher Education Program funds.

Tolowa Language Program:

Instruction at the Del Norte High School (DNHS) has been cancelled until winter/spring semester. The Tolowas language teacher has resigned and the Education Department is seeking to hire two positions before the next term begins.

Students who were signed up for Tolowa 1 & 2 classes were rescheduled into other classes.

(Administration for Native Americans) ANA Language Grant

The Language Program successfully completed and submitted an ANA Language and Maintenance grant for 2021. The grant focuses on the creation of a new 10 year Language plan. We are waiting to hear the ANA decision of award.

The Tolowa language program has received notice that we have been awarded the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Language grant. This grant has the focus of working the iPhone language app into the Android platform as well. This grant is in the amount of \$85,000.

Education:

The Demonstration grant is finishing the 11^{th} month in our 12 month planning year. Zak'ry Conger has a presentation.

BIA Living Languages Grant update.

Sheryl Steinruck has been hired to work on the YouTube channel. In the past, Sheryl has made several YouTube videos and has experience in recording.

Seamless Summer Food Program started June 14, 2021 ended on August 13, 2021. The two locations for meal distribution were at the Dat-naa-svt Community Center and Howonquet Hall, both of which are located in Smith River. Both sites were used to distribute meal bags to children 0 to 18 years of age. This program was very successful. It was the first year that the Education Department took on this project.

The Education Committee had their third meeting held on August 3, 2021. Future Education Committee meetings have been cancelled due to COVID-19 case increase.

Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation Library:

The library is closed until further notice due to COVID-19.

The Education Department applied for a grant to acquire a mobile Library. We are currently waiting to hear if the grant has been awarded.

Johnson O'Malley Program:

The Johnson O'Malley Program closed out the school supply card distribution for the 2021 school year. Cards were distributed at the Dat-naa-svt Community Center. Curry county had 64/82 participants at a participation rate of 75%. Del Norte had 150/178 participants at a participation rate of 84%.

Catastrophic Emergency Assistance:

Available to Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation Tribal Citizens who reside in our 5 county service area ONLY (Coos, Curry, Josephine, Del Norte and Humboldt)

- Payment may be provided to individuals or families who suffer fire, flood, or other destruction of their home and loss or damage to personal possessions. TDN will make payments only for essential needs and other non-medical necessities.
 - ♦ TDN Citizen must be 18 years and older
 - Primary residence of the applicant, provide verification
 - Primary residence is within the 5 county service area
 - Apply within two (2) weeks of home disaster

Elder Emergency Assistance:

Available to Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation Tribal Citizens who reside in our 5 county service area ONLY (Coos, Curry, Josephine, Del Norte and Humboldt)

Completed and accepted applications will be eligible for a
maximum allowance of \$500 per calendar year, to use towards an
emergency situation. Requests should be discussed with CFS staff
before purchase of any items to allow us to verify the need for a
replacement item. If an elder purchases fuel or similar items and
wishes to apply for reimbursement, this must be within two (2)

General Assistance:


- \$75 for trips one-way from 50 199 miles, or \$150 for trips oneway from 200 + miles, from a Tribal Citizens home.
- Payments are not made retro actively; Tribal Citizens have the responsibility to request assistance prior to appointment date, or in the case of an emergency, ten (10) business days of the appointment.
- Hospitalization Assistance: Available for members or their spouse who are hospitalized. Members or their spouses are eligible for \$100 a day after a verified hospitalization of three (3) consecutive days; up to, and not to exceed, \$1,000 for inpatient treatment. Limited to one per calendar year per member.
- Consecutive Treatment/Long Term Therapy: available for certain life threatening conditions including, but not limited to, cancer, renal failure, neurological disorders and coronary heart disease. Limited to one per calendar year per member.

NCIDC LIHEAP- Energy Assistance: Contact Monica Calvillo Available to Tolowa Dee-ni' Tribal Citizens who reside in Del Norte or Humboldt County ONLY

- Tribal Citizen must complete an NCIDC LIHEAP application and submit information specified on application; along with energy bill.
- NCIDC will verify information, approve or deny request.
