

Get Out the Count! Outreach for Language and Communication Access

There are many barriers for hard-to-count community members to participate in the Census such as historical discrimination, social alienation, living in rural and remote areas, immigration status, limited knowledge of the civic process, and limited English proficiency. To effectively engage with community members, CA Census partners have centered their strategic outreach efforts to be linguistically and culturally appropriate. Through these efforts, we hope to provide equal and meaningful access that would lead to an accurate and complete count.

CA Census partners are deploying individuals and organizations with a high level of trust among local communities, enabling them to communicate with community members in their preferred language. They connect with residents by valuing and prioritizing language access through translated materials, bilingual staff and volunteers at inperson events, in-language informational videos and Census songs. Trusted messengers --who may be elders, promotoras, faith leaders, educators, and young people-- nurture a culture of trust, engagement, buy-in and civic participation.¹

Along with the selected resources listed below, partners also provide a space in the community to motivate people to complete the Census and assist people who have difficulty completed the Census form.
